

President Atkins called the regular meeting to order at 12:30 p.m., and Manager Hopkins led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Present at roll call at the District were Directors Atkins, Cortopassi, McGaughey, McGurk, Panizza, Sanguinetti and Watkins. Also present were Manager Hopkins, Assistant Manager Vega, Finance Director Ram, Administrative Assistant Feliciano, and Legal Counsel Zolezzi. Present via teleconference was Consultant Barkett.

1. Minutes

a. Minutes 02/14/23 Regular Meeting

b. Minutes 02/16/23 Special Meeting

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with a handout amending agenda item D-1b.

3. Stockton East Water District – Verve Agreement Renewal

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with a memo regarding renewing the Verve agreement for managed information technology (IT) services. Manager Hopkins reported the District has been working with Verve Networks for the past twelve years as they have been managing the District’s IT. Manager Hopkins reported the agreement expired and due to COVID the District and Verve postponed updating the agreement. Manager Hopkins reported Verve Networks provided a proposal for Board approval. Assistant Manager Vega stated the current rate per user is \$93.75 per month with 46 users for a total monthly amount of \$4,312.50. Assistant Manager Vega reported Verve Networks approached Staff about restructuring and renegotiating the contract due to their rising costs to service the contract; the new contract proposal introduces a new rate structure with “limited” and “standard” users. Assistant Vega added “limited” users include Staff that work mostly out in the field and have limited need for computer-based tasks and “standard” users include Staff who work mainly at their desks using and require more IT support. The proposal set the cost for “limited” users at \$100 per month and \$165 per month for “standard” users. According to the new proposed rate structure the District would be charged for 24 “limited” users and 22 “standard” users. Assistant Manager Vega reported Verve also updated the per-instance services for desktop deployment to a time spent basis to be charged at \$150 per hour. Assistant Manager Vega stated working with Verve Networks has been an overall good experience; they are local and should an emergency occur Verve can send a technician on-site. Assistant Manager Vega recommended the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a contract with Verve Networks for Manager IT services within the annual budget of \$141,000.

Director McGurk inquired if the previous provider J4 also provided the same services. Assistant Manager Vega replied yes, however they were located out of town and were not as easily accessible to troubleshoot issues. Assistant Manager Vega reported Verve also manages our server and will alert Staff and resolve any issues that arise. Director McGurk inquired if Blackbaud is also serviced by Verve Networks. Assistant Manager Vega replied Blackbaud is a program that is not related to the managed IT services provided by Verve Networks.

Director Cortopassi inquired if Verve Networks also services the SCADA System. Assistant Manager Vega replied Verve Networks has provided hardware components but they do not provide support; Control Point Engineering provides the support for the SCADA system.

Director Panizza inquired about who services the District cell phones and iPads. Assistant Manager Vega replied Verizon Wireless provides the service however, the cell phones and iPads have been interfaced with the District’s server in order to operate Outlook exchange; Outlook allows for Staff to receive and send emails.

A motion was moved and seconded to authorize the General Manager to execute a contract with Verve Networks for Managed IT services, as presented.

E. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. ACWA Winter Regulatory Virtual Meeting – Groundwater Committee, 02/15/23
Director Watkins and Manager Hopkins attended the February 15, 2023 ACWA Winter Regulatory Virtual Meeting – Groundwater Committee. Manager Hopkins reported Department of Water Resources (DWR) presented a report that stated all critically over drafted basins that have not received a determination for their Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) will hear by the end of March. Manager Hopkins reported an update on the Central Valley Area aerial electromagnetic survey data; DWR will start preparations to begin phase two of the project to provide infill data for areas that show potential for groundwater recharge. Manager Hopkins reported the State Water Board is prepared to take over any basin that has gone into probation; all basins with plans that were not accepted by DWR. Manager Hopkins added the State Water Board will charge a base fee of \$300 per well plus a volume metric fee of \$25 - \$55 per acre-foot and a late fee of 25% per month; the fees will be charged at the well owner level. The State Board will inventory all the wells and may require metering which will all be at their discretion. Manager Hopkins stated the State Board fees are apart from any fees also charges at the GSA level. Director Panizza inquired if this also affects individuals with home wells. Director Watkins replied domestic wells are exempt. Discussion followed regarding the landowners in each GSA and the discretion of the State Board to charge growers living with GSA's with a plan not approved by DWR. Director Watkins stated the probability of our GSP being denied is low. Manager Hopkins reported a presentation was given by Dr. Rosemary Knight on using Paleo Valleys to Fast-Track Recharge. Manager Hopkins reported they provide direct access to aquifer formations and are located on the east side of the valley. Director Watkins added they are like alluvial fans connected to our groundwater basin; some alluvial fans come to the surface and they can be identified to create a recharge pond over it. Director Watkins continued that the water goes straight into the aquifer and follows the dry fans and goes right back into the groundwater basin. Director Watkins stated it mimics the dry well concept discussed in a previous meeting. Director Watkins stated it is exciting and cutting-edge research.
2. ACWA Winter Regulatory Virtual Meeting – Agriculture Committee, 02/15/23
Directors Atkins, Watkins and Manager Hopkins attended the February 15, 2023 ACWA Winter Regulatory Virtual Meeting – Agriculture Committee. Manager Hopkins reported Shasta is currently at 2.6 million acre-feet and the Bureau would like it to be at 3.8-4 million acre-feet to provide the correct temperature for this year's fish flow releases. Manager Hopkins reported the Sacramento Valley water year index 90% exceedance is below normal; San Joaquin Valley water year index 90% exceedance is above normal and close to being classified as a wet year. Manager Hopkins reported the New Melones Reservoir is being operated for storage conservation, a recent change from the X2 Outflow requirement; the Bureau plans to increase export pumping in the summer months in the Delta. Director Panizza inquired about the New Melones allocation. Manager Hopkins replied he did receive a letter for initial allocation of 49,000 acre-feet to the Eastside Division which is consistent with the firm water that Central San Joaquin Irrigation District receives and the first 15,000 acre-feet goes to the City of Stockton. Manager Hopkins reported item H-1 is a letter prepared by Legal Counsel Zolezzi to the Bureau for Reclamation asking for confirmation of the allocation we received, which is inconsistent with the policy the Bureau of Reclamation is implementing; in the policy the Eastside Division should be receiving 155,000 acre-feet. Discussion followed regarding New Melones allocation.
3. ACWA Winter Regulatory Virtual Meeting – Energy Committee, 02/15/23
Assistant Manager Vega attended the February 15, 2023 ACWA Winter Regulatory Virtual Meeting – Energy Committee. Assistant Manager Vega reported three presentations were given;

first by Evan Duffey with PG&E regarding utility response to atmospheric river events, work modeling micro climates to try to plan for fire disasters. Assistant Manager Vega reported the second presentation was given by Dede Subakti with California Independent Service Operator regarding the 2023 CAISO Power Grid Outlook; she reported a high demand with electric vehicles and the issues as a result have to be mitigated. Assistant Manager Vega added Dede Subakti stated an obvious solution would be electric vehicle users charging in the morning rather than at night; the distribution network is not prepared for electric vehicle charging. Assistant Manager Vega reported the third presentation was given by David Burdick with TerraVerde regarding market updates on net energy metering and advanced clean fleets, the new model to solar true-up. Assistant Manager Vega reported there is a new shift to fully electric vehicles for all local governments will be required; by 2024-2026 50% of all new vehicles must be electric and by 2027 100% of new vehicles must be electric. Assistant Manager Vega stated there is a requirement to report what vehicles and types are currently on your fleet and by 2039 all vehicles will be completely zero emissions.

F. REPORT OF GENERAL MANAGER

1. Water Supply Report as of 02/20/23

Manager Hopkins provided a handout of the Water Supply Report for information only that included storage, release, and production data collected from various sources as of midnight last night.

There is 174,920 AF in storage at New Hogan Reservoir. Current releases are set at 28 cfs. There is 1,066,088 AF in storage at New Melones Reservoir. Current releases are set at 52 cfs. Current release at Goodwin Dam to Stanislaus River are set at 201 cfs and release to all water users are set at 0 cfs. There are 0 irrigators on New Hogan, 0 irrigators on New Melones, and 0 irrigators out of District. The water treatment plant is currently processing 21 mgd. The City of Stockton is currently processing 13 mgd. Manager Hopkins reported the District wells total water extraction is 0 gpm (~0 mgd).

3. Report on General Manager Activities

a. San Joaquin County Office of Emergency Services – Agricultural Drought Task Force Meeting, 02/15/23

Assistant Manager Vega attended the February 15, 2023 San Joaquin County Office of Emergency Services – Agricultural Drought Task Force Meeting. Manager Vega stated good news in San Joaquin County with above normal water year is currently at 150-300% normal. The total water year precipitation for Water Year 2022-2023 is currently 156% of normal with numbers currently falling from what was reported in December – January. Assistant Manager Vega reported snowpack is above normal at over 100% which will only continue with the wet weather through May.

b. CVP Water Association – Executive and Financial Affairs Community Meeting, 02/17/23

Finance Director Ram attended the February 17, 2023 CVP Water Association – Executive and Financial Affairs Community Meeting. Finance Director Ram reported the meeting began with an announcement that the next meeting will be in-person in Sacramento on March 22, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. Finance Director Ram reported Kevin Kasberg will be sending an ECO report which is an updated CVPIA Expenditures and Collections report through fiscal

year 2021; after the report is received we can reach out to Kevin with any questions. Finance Director Ram stated a water rights memo put together by Lisa Holm will be presented at the next meeting as she was not available for the meeting. Finance Director Ram added a question was posed inquiring if the Bureau has a schedule for when the water rights memo will be released to the public. The response stated the Bureau will make it their priority but a standalone meeting may be scheduled to review the memo. Finance Director Ram reported Sabir Ahmed was supposed to host a WIIN Act Workshop on February 10th but it did not happen; there are internal concerns and budget discussions regarding transferring from water storage fund to the reclamation fund, until the process is complete, the workshop will be postponed. Finance Director Ram reported the 2023 Warren Act rates were released at \$3.72 per acre-foot for O&M for non-project contractors and the rate will change based on deliveries and cost per year. Finance Director Ram reported last year the Warren Act rate was \$16.67 per acre-foot; the rate is much lower than previous years. The input from the contractors was taken into consideration when calculating the rate. Finance Director Ram stated as soon as the Warren Act report is received, she will share it with the Board.

c. Stockton East Water District Activities Update

Manager Hopkins stated Staff reached out to Out-of-District customers that have executed temporary water transfer agreements in the past and four of those customers were interested in receiving Out-of-District surface water. Manager Hopkins inquired if the Board had any objection to him reaching out to Oakdale and South San Joaquin Irrigation Districts for a one-year water transfer. Discussion followed regarding the temporary water transfer agreements.

Manager Hopkins reported he and Consultant Barkett set up a virtual meeting with Josh Harder's Legislative Staff on Friday, February 24, 2023 at 11:00 a.m. if the Board would like to attend. Manager Hopkins stated if the Board would like to participate he would notice the virtual meeting as a Special Board Meeting.

Manager Hopkins reported Staff received the revised salary survey and will be scheduling a committee meeting next week; Manager Hopkins would like to present the salary survey for Board approval at the meeting following the committee meeting.

Manager Hopkins reported the District has finally satisfied the Delta Refill obligation from the 2021 Water Transfer Agreement from New Melones; a report was sent monthly to the State. Director Watkins inquired what the requirement entailed. Manager Hopkins stated the State required the District release 7,500 acre-feet of New Hogan Reservoir water into the San Joaquin Delta; the water released for flood control purposes is the water that counted toward the 7,500 acre-feet. Director Cortopassi inquired why the New Hogan Reservoir water satisfied the requirement for the New Melones contract. Legal Counsel Zolezzi replied it was an exchange; the District sold New Melones water and used New Hogan Water in exchange. Director Watkins added if the New Hogan water was not used it would have had to be release to the Delta; cannot hurt the downstream users or the Delta users. This item was for information only.

G. DIRECTOR REPORTS

1. North San Joaquin Water Conservation District – Town Hall Meeting, 02/15/23

Directors Atkins, Panizza and Manager Hopkins attended the February 15, 2023 North San Joaquin Water Conservation District – Town Hall Meeting. Director Atkins reported the meeting had a good turnout with ~40 attendees. Director Atkins reported the attendees were inquiring

about their charges and how the funds are being used. Director Atkins reported discussion regarding SGMA and what can be done to repair the pipelines. Director Atkins reported North San Joaquin Water Conservation District (NSJWCD) is looking for a General Manager. Director Atkins reported a customer inquired what the minimum sized parcel is before being charged and the answer of five acres was given; the rates were reported at \$15 per acre-foot with a gradual increase within five years to reach \$25 per acre-foot. . Director Atkins reported discussion regarding the DREAM Pilot Program recharge project that has proven to be a success. Director Atkins reported they provided maps which were very informative. Director Panizza commented the map illustrated projects which seemed to be geared toward the west side of the district. Discussion followed regarding the projects and costs illustrated on the map provided by NSJWCD. Director Atkins reported Board Member Flinn left the NSJWCD board and a new board member will be appointed by the end of the month.

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with a response letter sent to the Bureau of Reclamation regarding the Notice of Initial 2023 Water Allocation; Legal Counsel Zolezzi prepared the letter in response to the allocation letter received from the Bureau of Reclamation requesting clarification on their policy. Legal Counsel Zolezzi reported a response has not been received. This item was for information only.

Background

Since the DJW WTP was designed and constructed in the late 1970s, Engineering and Maintenance have struggled to keep all electrical drawings updated with the multiple improvement projects over the years. There is a need to combine all redline changes to multiple drawings into one main set of electrical sheets.

Summary

District Staff have been working with several Electrical Engineering design firms over the last couple of years. Staff requested a professional services proposal from three consultant firms. As shown in Table 1 below, A T.E.E.M. Electrical Engineering, Inc. provided the best pricing for high level single-line diagrams based off existing drawings and elevations of MCCs and Switchboards.

The Professional Services Planning Fiscal Year 22-23 budget has \$50,000 for Engineering Consultation. A T.E.E.M. Electrical Engineering, Inc. proposes their services for a not to exceed amount of \$28,060. With a 10% contingency, the budget would be \$30,866.

Recommendations

District Staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to approve a Professional Services Agreement with A T.E.E.M. Electrical Engineering, Inc. to provide design services for updating the District's single-line diagrams and MCC and Switchboard elevation layouts in the amount of \$28,060, plus a 10% contingency of \$2,806, for a total of \$30,866, and make all other necessary approvals.

On behalf of the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) and the undersigned organizations, we write to express our support for SB 23 (Caballero), which would streamline the permitting process of water supply and flood risk reduction projects in California while preserving established environmental protections. We believe this legislation is critical to ensuring that California's water infrastructure is modernized and made more resilient to the impacts of climate change.

California faces a range of water management challenges, including droughts, floods, and other natural disasters. While our weather patterns have always been variable, climate change has, and will continue to exacerbate the weather whiplash that is intensifying drought and precipitation events. Addressing these challenges requires a coordinated effort between state and local agencies to construct and maintain water infrastructure projects needed in a 21st century climate. Unfortunately, the current permitting process for water infrastructure projects in California is complex and lengthy, and can be a significant barrier to progress in expanding and improving our water supply and flood risk reduction systems. This can result in delays, higher project costs, and uncertainty for communities, agricultural interests, and businesses that rely on a reliable and sustainable water supply. In addition, this can result in worse environmental outcomes, delaying projects that provide important benefits to aquatic and natural resources.

SB 23 would help address these issues by identifying opportunities to improve and streamline the regulatory permitting process, without shortcutting environmental reviews, so these critical infrastructure projects are built at the pace and scale needed to prepare for climate change. SB 23 would address inefficiencies in the application review process and ensure project proponents and state agencies are meeting reasonable deadlines and moving applications forward in an expeditious manner. The bill would utilize permit streamlining tools already available in existing law that are proven to reduce duplicative planning efforts while still meeting rigorous environmental standards. Finally, the bill would help address state agency resource and staffing issues by allowing project applicants to cover the costs of expediting the environmental review process.

SB 23 builds on recommendations in the Newsom Administration's "California's Water Supply Strategy, Adapting to a Hotter, Drier Future," released in August 2022. The Water Supply Strategy highlights that hotter and drier conditions caused by climate change could reduce California's water supplies in the coming decades. To continue to grow and thrive as a state, California will need to make up for a loss of supply by pursuing a wide range of infrastructure projects. An essential part of seeing

these projects become reality, according to the Newsom Administration, is modernizing and accelerating regulatory structures. SB 23 answers this call to action by providing a comprehensive set of ideas that address known sources of project delays. These solutions would accelerate projects that store more water above and below ground, capture water during high-flow events, improve conveyance, repurpose and de-salt water, and improve flood management—all of which are necessary to adapting to changing conditions.

From 2020 to 2022, California experienced the driest three-year period on record. In 2023, this prolonged drought was met with a series of atmospheric rivers and a bomb cyclone that brought significant amounts of rain and snow, leading to widespread flooding, property damage, and evacuation orders for tens of thousands of residents. The need for a generational investment in California’s water systems is evident, and over the last three years, state leaders have earmarked more than \$8 billion to modernize water infrastructure and management. Now action is needed to ensure these investments result in shovels in the ground. SB 23 is a critical step to providing California with modern, resilient, and sustainable water systems that will meet the needs of generations to come.

For these reasons, we are pleased to support SB 23.

Dear Mr. Simmons:

I am writing to submit comments on the draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the proposed Delta Conveyance Project (Delta Tunnel). The Department of Water Resources (DWR) has been actively pursuing unsustainable isolated water conveyance infrastructure that would remove freshwater flows from the Delta for the benefit of other parts of the state since the 1980s. The Delta Tunnel is the latest iteration, however, many of the impacts that plagued previous versions (the Bay Delta Conservation Plan and California WaterFix) are still present in the Delta Tunnel.

The DEIS is inadequate and fails to inform the public of the true extent of the environmental impacts as required by the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). I understand that the state faces a difficult task in combating the current water crisis. However, the Delta Tunnel would create a sacrifice zone in the Delta region from the social, economic, and environmental impacts of the project.

The DEIS does not adequately analyze and mitigate the impacts on Delta communities. The project would destroy nearly 3,800 acres of highly productive Delta farmland, which currently helps feed the people of California. A so-called "Community Benefits Program" cannot address the very real impacts to residents during and after construction. This is unacceptable given the extensive and lasting impacts the project would have on the quality of life in the region. For example, criteria and toxic air pollutants, including particulate matter, would increase, and at times double, as a result of project construction, endangering the health of Delta residents. Additionally, many Delta residents and businesses would be exposed to years of construction noise and traffic, degrading quality of life, harming tourism and recreation and causing loss of business revenues.

I urge the Corps to require consideration of alternatives to the Delta Tunnel including other projects and actions that can meet water supply needs without destroying the Delta. Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on this project and please add me to the notice list.

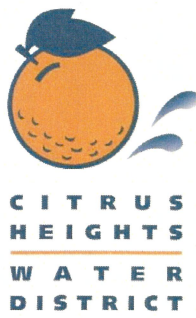

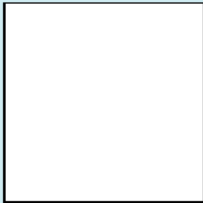

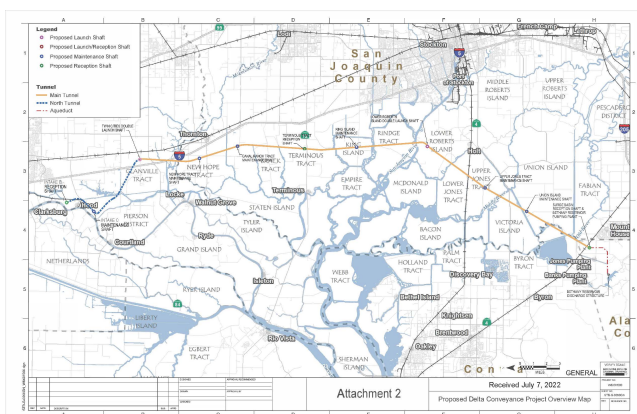
